In 2001, I had the opportunity to revisit Phantom Lake Camp to introduce a new program, sea kayaking. Camp had always been a nurturing place, but I wondered how the staff and campers would respond to a 50-year old guy

who hadn't had contact with camp kids for over 20 years! A rather haunting question of whether I was in the right place weighed on my mind. As I settled into the luxurious accommodations of the Phantom Lake Hilton, any apprehension I may have had was quickly extinguished as the familiar sense of extended family embraced me.

Four Generations Experience the "Magic" of PLYC

"I still get that butterfly feeling in my stomach when I pull up, now, to bring my children to camp," says Stephanie Rose (Williams-Kohn), who is the third generation of four in her family that have attended Phantom Lake Camp. "My grandmother, who is 91 years old and still lives in Waukesha, was the first of our family to attend the camp. The experiences here are so wonderful – actually, kind of magical - that sending our children generation after generation was, or is, never given a second thought."

Not only does Stephanie's immediate family attend camp, but her aunts and cousins do as well. "Two of my cousins and their children come from Florida and Montana," she remarks.

Considering her most memorable moments, Stephanie says she remembers being part of the first coed camp in 1977. It was a move the camp staff was apprehensive of, but the results were overwhelmingly positive. "There was some concern that girls and boys might pair up, like teens do, but it was the spirit of camp – the all-over intention of the camp mission - that left no room for silly adolescent behavior. Great friendships developed between the genders that had no other connotation".

Another thing that Stephanie is most proud of is the number of Arrowheads she has collected for the many years that she attended camp. They serve as a very pleasant reminder of joy she had participating in activities and getting to know other campers.

Stephanie's children Hanna (14), Jake (11) and Josh (9) Kohn attend camp every year and she anticipates that

her grandchildren will do the same. "My daughter still cries when her stay comes to an end," says Stephanie. "My boys really enjoy the many activities camp provides, and my daughter enjoys the people she meets and the friends she makes.

"I can't tell you how many people I meet, regularly, that have been a part of Phantom Lake Camp, either as a past camper or part of the staff," Stephanie remarks. It is no surprise! The camp's reputation is far reaching and has a certain magnetic element that draws in adults and children who truly enjoy having good, clean fun.

Growing up at Camp

"My work as a psychologist was influenced by my experiences at Phantom Lake," Pam Shapson says. "At camp, I was surrounded with diversity and got to know people at a much deeper level than during any other time of my life. I have always considered the friends I made at camp, an extended part of my family."

Pam's parents, Gerry and Sue Carman, ran Phantom Lake camp for 35 years. Gerry was the Camp's director, Sue the cook.

"It all started when I saw a 3X5 card on a bulletin board advertising 'help wanted' for a camp counselor,' says Gerry. "After college, I taught school but I always had this certain desire to run the camp. In 1962, with a little influence from the YMCA staff, I came aboard as a youth director and through the years worked as an office manager, camp director and CEO at Phantom Lake."

Pam's mother started out working at the camp store, but eventually took over the kitchen. She cooked for roughly 200 campers and staff, every day, three times a day, throughout the entire camp season. Not an easy task, yet Sue loved the work.

Pam and her three brothers spent whole summers at camp, learning respect and building life-long connections. Now her son, Sam, and daughter, Elisa, spend a few weeks every year. Sam will be in the AC

3rd year junior counselor program this year; Elisa will be a camper. "My children love everything about the Phantom Lake experience, but the two themes that interest them the most are the craft shop and boating programs. Horseback riding has also been a favorite with my daughter."

"Another very memorable a part of camp is the ceremony of Phantom Square," adds Pam. "It is likely the most spiritual part of the day and is spectacular, every time."

This family's ties run very deep at Phantom Lake. There is a garden named in honor of Pam's deceased brother, Richard Riedesel. Richard had been actively involved as a Stewart and staff person at camp for many years. Pam's other brother Christopher Carmen recently served as the interim CEO for about eight months.

Phantom Lake has been a very influential part of this family and will likely continue to be so for generations to come.

"Even though I was only there for one summer, I had a wonderful time and made some great memories," says
